




Housing and poverty are human rights issues in Terrace

Access to health care is a human rights issue in Terrace




Recruitment and retention of family physicians is a challenge for the community. Terrace has a new regional hospital opening in 2025. However, there are concerns about how the new hospital will be staffed given the existing recruitment and retention challenges in the community.

Discrimination against Indigenous people, people experiencing homelessness, people with mental health challenges and people who use substances is a barrier to the health services that are available in the community.



The toxic drug emergency

To access detox and addiction treatment, people often have to travel by bus to Prince George or Vancouver.



Gender-based violence

Gender-based violence associated with the resource sector is a human rights issue. Indigenous women face discrimination from health care providers and law enforcement when trying to get help. This is consistent with findings of the National Inquiry on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls that resource extraction projects have been linked to violence against Indigenous women in communities across Canada.



Discrimination in education



Students and parents reported bullying and harassment of students, anti-indigenous racism, unequal access to supports for those with disabilities and challenges for LGBTQ2SAI+ students. This unequal treatment is a barrier to education in Terrace.
